Save This Date - March 12, 2018

Mark your calendar for a major OVHS event at the Zellweger mansion on Monday, March 12, 2018. The building was once owned by John Zellweger, one of the early partners in Steam Pump Ranch. The structure has been beautifully restored and tours will be offered. Refreshments will include a variety of hors d'oeuvres, and wine for purchase. Short talks on the history of Pusch and Zellweger will be offered, along with a silent auction. Buses (at a small added cost) will be provided to transport guests from Oro Valley to the downtown site. Descendants of both George Pusch and John Zellweger will be present. Tickets will be on sale December 1st.

From the Arizona Citizen, July 5, 1879: "Messrs. Pusch and Zellweger of Tucson, have just had a large redwood tank built for their cattle ranch north of Town. These two men are growing wealthy steadily and may now be considered among the 'solid ones.'"

The Restoration of an Antique Doll named "Tootsie"

When the Society was formed in 2005, Pusch descendant Henry Zipf donated an old trunk with family memorabilia. Among the many treasures in the trunk were 15 pieces of a German made doll. In the fall of 2016, the Collections Committee examined and researched the historic doll. It seemed that we had an historically significant artifact and work should be done to restore this vintage doll to her former beauty.

One lady agreed to re-string the doll and replace the sleeping eyes. She also provided a beautiful, auburn wig for a doll now known as "Tootsie." This was the nickname of George and Mathilda Pusch's daughter, Gertrude Pusch Zipf, presumably her original owner.

The next step was to clothe this young lady. Funds were solicited for her costume. An OVHS member referred us to a highly successful doll costume designer in Tucson by the name of Ruth Fahden. Her work has won many awards. Part of Gertrude's satin wedding dress was included in the costume. In August 2017, the project was completed and returned to the Society.
