Board meetings are generally held once a month and vary as to date and time. They are open to the public and are usually held at the Oro Valley Library. Please check our web calendar for specifics.

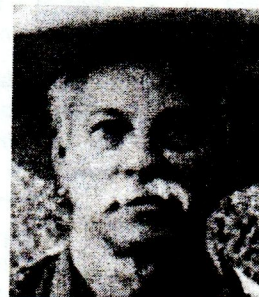

"Geronimo's Surrender: The 1886 C. S. Fly Photographs"

Presented by Jay Van Orden, Tucson



Jay Van Orden worked for the Arizona Historical Society (AHS) for thirty-two years. As Director of Field Services, he made and maintained connections with most of the state's local history museums. He remains busy in retirement with research and writing

related to Geronimo, the Apaches, and the Civil War in Arizona, as well as the restoration of classic automobiles and motor scooters. He represents AHS on the State Historic Sites Review Committee.

In March 1886, representatives of two warring nations met at Cañon de los Embudos near the Arizona-Mexico border. The names and deeds of Geronimo and the Chiricahua Apaches, and of General George Crook and the U.S. Army, have long been recorded in history books. Most major publications, however, have presented a one-sided view of the event and inaccurately or incompletely identified participants. In this presentation, Van Orden reexamines both the historical accounts and the photographed records of the surrender talks, and discusses critical, and heretofore missing, information.

The short business part of our meeting will be our Annual Meeting, required by our bylaws to elect Directors to replace those with expiring terms (terms are 3 years). Those with expiring terms are Dick Eggerding and Pat Spoerl and one vacancy left by the recent passing of our president Jim Kriegh. The Board has opted to add two additional Directors as allowed by the Bylaws. A total of five positions will be filled.

The meeting location is at the Town of Oro Valley Council Chambers, 11,000 N. La Canada, Oro Valley.

Historic Preservation Commission News

The master planning process for Steam Pump Ranch is nearing the final stages. The consultant presented a preferred design scenario and economic model to the Commission and Town Council in February based on Task Force recommendations and public input.

The Master Plan Report is scheduled for completion in April with subsequent review by the Commission and Town Council. Commission members are Bob Baughman, Chair, Salette Latas, Vice Chair, Marilyn Cook, Lois Nagey, Pat Spoerl, and Dan Zweiner. The position held by Jim Kriegh on the Commission as Town Historian is currently vacant.

Rattlesnake Queen

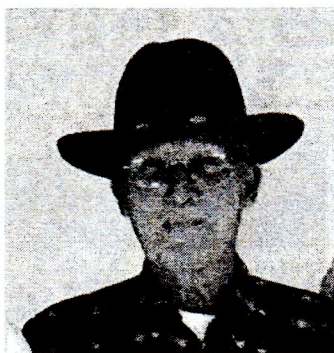
A unique story about Catherine Reidy who caught and used rattlesnakes in unique ways during the depression to help make ends meet.

Jim Kriegh, our Oro Valley Historical Society co-founder and first President. Jim passed away last October and has left us with a huge void to fill. One such void is to prepare the newsletter every few months. This is the first formal newsletter since his passing.

Jim was also the primary mover to get many activities and initiatives started. Dick Eggerding and Pat Spoerl were also very instrumental in getting the Society formally incorporated as a non-profit, April 2005, and have served with Jim as the founding members.

Four Directors were subsequently elected to serve three year terms to 2009. The three year terms of the first three officers are expiring in March 2008, thus we are holding elections for these positions. The Board voted to add two additional Directors as allowed per our By-Laws. The total number to be elected is five, bringing the Board to nine.

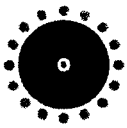
