

The First Development Project for the Steam Pump Ranch has been Approved!

The Oro Valley Historical Society and the Town attorneys completed their operating agreement so the Native American Garden Project could proceed to the Town Council for discussion and consideration. It was approved at the February 18th Council Meeting and subsequently signed by the Mayor and our OVHS President.

We are very excited to have the green light to proceed with our plans. We are planning to have the garden site ready for a monsoon planting this summer. We will need lots of volunteers to help once we get the garden underway. The Native American Garden will be located on the north side of the property and will start with traditional corn, beans, and squash with native agaves nearby. We are researching designs, crops, and watering methods and want to connect the community and our schools to native and historic foods and farming methods.

The initial concept for the garden has two areas. The enclosed area will be the "Three Sisters" garden which includes corn, beans and squash planted together as companion plants. The garden will provide not only an educational opportunity but establish the connection to local sources and growing practices. Plans are for some community gatherings as well.

Outside of the circular enclosed area will be rocky mounds with Agave *murpheyi* plants. This was an important food and fiber source for the Hohokam who farmed in the area.

Our agreement also includes permission to conduct guided tours at Steam Pump Ranch one Saturday per month. We plan to start the tours this summer. Stay tuned for more information and opportunities to participate.

March 26th - Hohokam Lifeways in the Northern Tucson Basin

Dr. Suzanne Fish is a curator of archaeology at the Arizona State Museum and a professor of anthropology at the University of Arizona. For many years her research has focused in the Arizona-Sonora borderlands involving ethnobotany, traditional farming and Hohokam settlement patterns and social organization.

April 9th - Our Ranching Legacy

This will be a panel discussion providing various perspectives on the Ranching heritage of the greater Oro Valley area. 


