

- U of A students advised by Kelly Leslie have presented a variety of design plans to enhance our exhibits at the Pusch House.
- OVHS* raised \$850 from the sales of Jim Click raffle tickets. The Board thanks all who purchased tickets in this fundraising event.
- The fire suppression system and security system are active at the Pusch House Museum. Thank you TOV* for the continued improvements at Steam Pump Ranch Historical Park.
- The OVHS board has contacted TOV Community and Economic Development and indicated that we would like to be included for input for the 10-year General Plan that is currently underway.
- The OVHS gave a quarterly report to the TOV Historic Preservation Commission that gave updates of our activities at Steam Pump Ranch and requests for property improvements.
- The OVHS and TOV is framing an agreement for use of storage space in the new Parks and Recreation office space at Steam Pump Ranch.

OV HISTORY TIDBIT

GEORGE PUSCH & JOHN ZELLWEGER & THE NARROW GAUGE RAILROAD

These two enterprising men likely met shortly after arriving in the United States. George arrived in New York on October 28, 1865 from Echzell in Hesse, Germany. John (Johann) immigrated from Switzerland aboard the Bellona from England in September 1865.

Pusch and Zellweger were partners in a variety of businesses. First was the Pioneer Meat Market at 34 East Congress. Then they established the Tucson Ice and Cold Storage company on Toole Avenue. This operation included the sale of ice, coal, and even beer. Little by little their real estate, businesses and ranching endeavors expanded, fulfilling their hopes of finding prosperity in America.

Besides their businesses in Tucson, they were partners in the Steam Pump Ranch operation and each had ranches to the north; Feldman Ranch (Pusch) just north of Mammoth and the Teacup Ranch (Zellweger) near Kelvin. Both George and John were directors of the Tucson Globe and Northern Railroad. The Steam Pump Ranch was likely to be a depot stop for the train line they were proposing. (The line was originally planned to be a narrow gauge but that project was reorganized and changed to a standard gauge.) It is no surprise that George and John became involved with the Tucson Globe and Northern Railroad. It would have benefited both of them immensely given the location of their properties and businesses.

Unfortunately, the Tucson Globe and Northern Railroad was not able to amass enough funding and folded. Many assets were sold to other railroad companies Perhaps the demise of the railroad wasn't so bad after all....can you imagine a rail line on Oracle Road?
