Our Historical Society Continues to Prosper!

The Oro Valley Historical Society has made significant progress in the past four years implementing our mission "To promote research, preservation, education and dissemination of history related to the greater Oro Valley area". Formation of the Society in 2005



Incorporation as a 501(c)3 non-profit organization, Bylaws, Mission statement, and a Logo launched us in the right direction. Three officers and four directors were installed to move forward. Jim Kriegh had been networking and collecting many historical documents prior to the formation of the Society. Most of these are from Henry Zipf, grandson of George Pusch who established the Steam Pump Ranch.

Historical Richness



The greater Oro Valley area contains significant historic places that can be identified as "What Happened Under Your Feet". Hohokam villages existed here over a thousand years ago. Before then migratory hunters and gatherers undoubtedly traveled the area along the Canada del Oro. Tours are planned for the future at the few archaeological sites that still remain. People continued to travel through the area during the Spanish and Mexican settlement period. Once the United States acquired this land, miners, ranchers and settlers came. Ranching boomed in the 1880s with the Steam Pump Ranch being a significant operation. The Society is planning to develop historic gardens at the property. Future tours and events are also being planned by us.

Activities - Events - Partnerships



Accession activities to catalog hundreds of documents, photos and items using Past Perfect museum software is under way. We have initiated the oral interview process to capture significant events. We coordinate closely with the Town and The Historical Preservation Commission. Two library cases in the OV Library are maintained with historical items. Presentations are given about our Society and Steam Pump Ranch. We sponsor fund-raising events such as barbecues and hayrides at White Stallion Ranch, and book-signing events. This year we will focus on Town Heritage Month in April.

Communication - Meetings



An important aspect of our Mission is to disseminate information. Formal newsletters are now published every two months. Our web site makes information readily available for both Society news and historical information. EMail is also heavily used to communicate with other organizations, between directors and to our members. Informative historical topical meetings are open to all. About four to six general meetings or events each year includes an annual business meeting in March to elect directors (staggered three year terms).

Financial



The Society is a non-profit organization which generates all of its own income from memberships, donations, fund raising, and grants. Our expenses include a small amount for administrative expenses such as archival materials and software with most for activities directly related to member benefits such as meetings, newsletters, displays and events. A 2008 financial summary will soon be on our web site.

The Historical Society has received \$5,000 from the Town of Oro Valley Community Funding Program to help fund an Oro Valley Heritage Month during the birthday celebration next April (the Town's 35th birthday). We will have several very exciting events to celebrate Heritage month focusing on several time periods prior to the forming of the Town of Oro Valley.

* March 19th - Hohokam Lifeways...

Suzanne Fish, PhD, will talk about Hohokam Lifeways near the Canada de Oro which started about 800 AD. We will explore the ruins discovered in the greater Oro Valley area and other significant events. Thursday, OV Library, 6:30 PM.

* March 28th - Romero Ruin Tour

A walking (easy hike) tour of the Romero Ruin in Catalina State Park. It is co-sponsored with Coronado National Forest and will be led by Forest Service archaeologists. Tour starts on Saturday morning at 9 AM and lasts no longer than two hours. Reservations required.

* April 3rd - Honey Bee Village Tour

A tour of Honey Bee Village Archaeological Preserve led by Henry Wallace from Desert Archaeology. Tour starts on Friday morning at 8 AM (tentative) and lasts no longer than two hours. Reservations required.

* April 9th - Our Ranching Legacy


