We are going to use that to design and install permanent signs at Steam Pump Ranch to let visitors know about the history of the Ranch even when our volunteers are not present. The sign committee has met three

times to review layout, picture options, and copies and will continue the process as they decide where those signs will be placed. We are so grateful to the Chamber for this grant and to the sign committee for their diligence.

TREASURES AND TWINK



Perhaps you know that in 1995 Jim Kriegh, Town founder and co-founder of Oro Valley Historical Society, discovered a large meteorite field in Northwest Arizona. The meteorites from this discovery were named Gold Basin. He and others including Twink Monrad, Oro Valley Historical Society member, worked with the University of Arizona to map the field in secret, and later it was announced to the public so now anyone can hunt for meteorites there.

Over the next few years Jim accumulated a meteorite collection of specimens from all over the world by trading and buying. He wanted to have part of his collection donated to the Oro Valley Historical Society. This collection is now on permanent display at Steam Pump Ranch in the Pusch House Museum and

can be seen Saturday mornings from 9 a.m. - noon.

Since Jack Procter had been manager of the prestigious Pioneer Hotel from 1932 to 1962, Elena was interested in learning more about his personal history including his connection to the Ranch.
