# **Two Early Oro Valley Schools**

Oro Valley had few schools before the housing boom occurred in the post-World War II era. In the 1930s, students could attend either one public school or an exclusive private school in our immediate area.

The Catalina School was located on the east side of Oracle Road, north of Steam Pump Ranch and the Canada del Oro Wash. The school offered instruction for all children from the area in grades one through eight. One female teacher was paid \$ 1350 per year to instruct all of the students. In the 1932-33 school year, Catalina School had thirty students, seventeen boys and thirteen girls. The library consisted of thirty-five books and the school building was valued at \$ 600. The total school budget for the Catalina School for that year was \$ 1511. In the 1935-36 school year, twenty students were enrolled and sixteen finished the year and were promoted to the next grade. The school report noted that four of the students were "Mexicans." Local residents Lue Skinner, an optometrist in Tucson, and Carl Johnson served on the school supervisory committee.

The Arizona Desert School for Boys sat at the other end of the economic spectrum. It was located at the east end of Magee Road, near the mouth of Pima Canyon. This school enrolled students from age eight through fifteen. Headmaster Matthew Baird was a graduate of Princeton University and attended Oxford University in Great Britain. Founded in 1927, the school offered an



atmosphere of "vigor and happiness" (AZ Daily Star). In 1932, twenty-four students enrolled from exclusive places like Southampton, Long Island, Chestnut Hill, PA, Scarsdale, NY, and Beverly Hills, CA. Wealthy families sent their sons to this adobe complex in the desert for rigorous academic classes and to ride horses, play polo and camp out in the wild. The board of directors and student body included prominent Midwest and Eastern names like Peabody, Armour, Westinghouse, Gould, Havemeyer and Whitney. Each student's parents paid \$2500 tuition and were required to purchase a horse for an additional \$60. The school closed in 1953 and the buildings were later bulldozed.

It is interesting that one student's tuition at the Arizona Desert School for Boys would more than pay for the entire public Catalina School annual budget in the 1930s!
