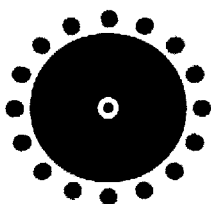

Additional Oro Valley Historical Society Information

1. The purchase of the Steam Pump Ranch is in the final stages. Purchase of 9 acres is currently being finalized and the remaining 6 acres is to be completed by the end of December 2006. The Town of Oro Valley is putting together a group to develop a Master Plan for the site which should be starting work this month. A member of the Historical Society will be included on the Team.
3. We now have 123 memberships. This number treats family membership as 'one' therefore the voting membership is somewhere between 140 and 160.
4. The Society has now obtained the equipment necessary for conducting and recording oral history interviews. Also, the Society has obtained speaker and projection equipment for use at member meeting programs.
5. The Society had a Booth at the Oct. 28th and 29th GOVAC Arts in the Park event. This Booth was donated as a courtesy of GOVAC. It was a very successful event and the OVHS had many visitors who expressed a interest in the work of the Society.
6. Committees continue to organize. We will have additional information about Committee activities at the November 16th meeting. So please consider contributing your time and expertise to any of the committees that are of interest to you. These include Archival, Fundraising, Oral History, Public Relations, Student Education, and Research, and Steam Pump Planning.
