Historic Steam Pump Ranch - Public Debut Enjoyed By All

In April, the Oro Valley Historical Society and the Town of Oro Valley sponsored a "Community Heritage Day" for the grand unveiling of the Historic Steam Pump Ranch. The public was invited to an Open House and were treated to several events including history sharing, ranching and Native American demonstrations, story telling, and many displays.

There was even an opportunity to have your photo taken with life size cutouts of George and Mathilda Pusch.

The Pusch ranch house was a popular gathering point to hear Alice Duckworth and others relate stories about the Pusch family and ranch life on the Steam Pump Ranch. Historic architecture was presented by Drew Gorski.

Information was given about George Pusch and his active role in politics, including serving on the Territorial Legislature, state constitutional convention, and Tucson City Council.

Although the ranch house was not open to the public, the windows gave an opportunity to peek in and see some of the features.

There were several Historical Society History Stations placed at various locations that included old photos, displays, and historic information.

There were story tellers, a strolling cowboy with guitar, a cowboy poet, story tellers, a point maker chipping rocks, artifact displays, a petting zoo, ranching demonstrations, horse shoeing demonstrations, a cake cutting celebration for Oro valley's 35th birthday, and food vendors.

Some of the recently discovered photos found in the chicken coops were also on display. Most of these are from the Proctor era (1933 - 1972).

President's Message - An Great Preservation Month



April was a great month for Oro Valley and for the Historical Society. For those of you who participated in any of the events and programs of the first Oro Valley Town Heritage Month I think you'll agree that it was a success. The Historical Society sponsored site tours of the Honey Bee Village Archaeological Preserve and the Romero Ruin. We held a series of lectures with topics

ranging from the Hohokam, to ranching, to railroading. We prepared heritage guides to inform residents and visitors about important historic places and people, and an educators guide for use by teachers and students. And, we participated with the Town in Community Heritage Day where Steam Pump Ranch was open to the public for the first time.

Such events always lead to questions about "what's next?" The Town is actively pursuing funding from a variety of sources to restore the most at-risk structures at Steam Pump Ranch. The Society will be starting the Native American garden in June, and we will be further documenting the photographs recovered from the chicken coops during the summer months. 







Mr. Caywood was born and raised in Tucson where he attended Catalina High School and the University of Arizona. He is one of the founders of Old Pueblo Trolley and has spent the last 25 years leading the organization. He is a transit historian and author of several publications focusing on Tucson's transit and railroad history. He has been employed for many years in the transportation consulting field, and currently works for Parsons Brinckerhoff's Tucson office as a planner and designer of transit and roadway facilities.

Old Pueblo Trolley is a nonprofit corporation that began with the goal of bringing electric streetcars back to Tucson's city streets. Its museum division operates the Southern Arizona Transportation Museum at the restored Southern Pacific railroad depot.

Mr. Caywood spoke to the Oro Valley Historical Society one year ago about the railroad's arrival in Tucson in 1880. He is back again to tell us about the narrow gauge railroad that almost made it to Oro Valley. Please join us for the program.




















Roxy Johnson and her brother Dan Reidy taken with a poster board story about their Mother Catherine
